Between past and present exists a place. A place that exists only if we dare to look for it. Through his strikingly vivid surrealist aesthetics, Johann Nobell paints a place, located somewhere between the contradictory poles of dream and reality. Abstract and figurative elements blend where deep symbolism can be found, challenging latent inhibitions. Dream-like sequences, subconscious imprints and individual impulses serve to mix the unknown and intangible. Nobell's narratives depict hallucinatory dramas that are as wondrous as they are terrifying.

Here, where the Old World meets the New World, where the desire to establish a new reality based on rationality, reason and science is confronted with the irrational: a land in which new heraldic symbols are filled with speculation, with hocus pocus and occult kitsch. Older works, in pastel palettes, depict often barren lands, desolate deserts inspired by American mythology and geography, that give birth to new works focusing on specific details of the mutated and abstracted life-forms that have germinated and magically grown there.

Nobell is in transition, and often shifts from frozen surface detail to a larger narrative. In conformity with Swedish cosmology, he keeps close correspondence between the small details in man/nature and the larger overarching context. For this artist, the microcosm is somewhere to be discovered in the macrocosm and vice versa. The constant prevailing atmosphere of ambiguity and open-endedness invites us to interpret and engage with the works, old or new, on their own terms. Can we bear the reality of what the future might hold? The door to dreams is left wide open.
